But there are others who have thoroughly enjoyed being barred from Church and these will be slow to entertain the thought of coming to a halfopened church. We are all ministers to them to come and experience the different church space. So far at St Joseph's, we did not find ourselves in a situation where stewards turned out anybody from Mass attendance. Numbers therefore dictate that restrictions are adhered to. This must be respected. Meetings have not been a problem. The lockdown has put some of us in a situation where we have become comfortable to be part of the virtual meetings. We have reason to thank God for that. We have to keep the distance but let us take care not to be distanced from the community since everything in us craves for contact and proximity. Let no one be allowed to be put in a situation where they are deprived of proximity. We have to become very creative in how we now do things. We are called to be different and imaginative in how we minister to each other.
