

22 nd	Pope Saint John Paul II (1920-2005)	Living in Christ as a family
October	He was born Karol Józef Wojtyła in 1920 in Wadowice, Poland. His studies for the priesthood were often carried out in secret and in fear of being caught by the government of Poland at that time which did not like Christians. Eventually in 1964, he became Archbishop of Kraków and on 16 October 1978 he was elected pope and took the name John Paul II. He recognised the importance of families spending "quality time" together and praying together. He had a special fondness for young people and the sick, and travelled widely around the world meeting Catholics of all ages.	 Organise a "secret surprise" for members of the family: Write everyone's name on a piece of paper and put the papers in a box. Each person closes their eyes and takes out a name at random (if it's their own, put it back) Do something nice or kind in secret for that person this week. Make sure you don't give the game away! Younger members of the family may need help with this! Suggestions: make someone else's bed, lay the table ready for a meal, tidy or clean up after someone else, make a nice card for someone help carry bags, bring in the washing, put away the laundry, clean the inside of the car
